We found evidence that Lopez-Aguilar, in her capacity as a commissioner on Hispanic/Latino Quality of Life Resource Advisory Commission (HLQRAC), appears to have participated in a vote on an agenda item that affected a nonprofit entity, Latino HealthCare Forum (LHCF), in which Lopez-Aguilar appears to have a substantial interest, as defined in City Code §2-7-2(10). The vote resulted in a recommendation to Council for funding to LHCF to offer outreach and enrollment services for health insurance to the "uninsured population" in Austin's Hispanic/Latino community. The proposed funding was incorporated into the City's Fiscal Year 2017



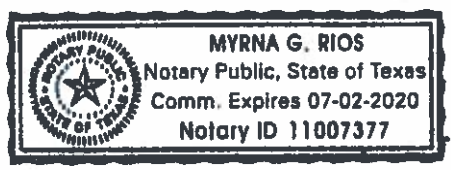

OFFICE OF THE CITY AUDITOR, INVESTIGATIVE COMPLAINT 2017 Office of the City Auditor Complaint Against Isabel Lopez-Aguilar

Investigation Results

The Office of the City Auditor (OCA) conducted an investigation into the allegations against Isabel Lopez-Aguilar, City Auditor, from January 2017 to March 2017. The investigation was initiated following a complaint received from a member of the public.

The OCA conducted a thorough review of all relevant documents, including emails, meeting minutes, and financial records, and interviewed the complainant and other relevant personnel.

The investigation found that the allegations were unsubstantiated. There is no evidence to support the claims made in the complaint. The OCA has concluded that the City Auditor's actions were in compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

The OCA has no further action to take at this time. The complainant is advised that the investigation has been completed and the results are as stated above.

Exhibit A

Allegation

In July 2016, the Office of the City Auditor received an allegation that Hispanic/Latino Quality of Life Resource Advisory Commission (HLQRAC) member Isabel Lopez-Aguilar is an employee of Latino HealthCare Forum, and that there may have been a conflict of interest resulting from these roles.

Background

HLQRAC "advise[s] the City Council on issues relating to the quality of life for the City's Hispanic/Latino Community and shall recommend programs and policies designed to alleviate any inequities that may confront Hispanics and Latinos in social, economic, and vocational pursuits including education, youth services, housing and community development, cultural arts, economic development, health, civic engagement, and transportation." Isabel Lopez-Aguilar was appointed to sit on the HLQRAC in March 2015. **[Exhibit B]**

The Latino HealthCare Forum (LHCF) is an Austin nonprofit organization that receives funding from the City of Austin to provide programs and services, specific to health, to vulnerable populations in Austin. **[Exhibit C]** LHCF's contract is administered by Austin Public Health. **[Exhibit N, page 6 under Personnel]** Isabel Lopez-Aguilar has worked for LHCF since January 2015. She is currently a Navigator and Program Coordinator at LHCF. **[Exhibit D]**

Investigation Results

We found evidence indicating that Isabel Lopez-Aguilar voted on an agenda item, in her capacity as a commissioner on HLQRAC, which ultimately funded LHCF to provide outreach and enrollment to health insurance for the "uninsured population" in Austin's Hispanic/Latino community.

According to City Code §2-7-63(a): Prohibition of Conflict of Interest:

"A city official or employee may not participate in a vote or decision on a matter affecting a natural person, entity, or property in which the official or employee has a substantial interest..."

As a commissioner to service on HLQRAC in March 2015, Isabel Lopez-Aguilar appears to be considered a city official as defined in City Code §2-7-2 (3): **[Exhibit B]**

"City official, unless otherwise expressly defined, includes individuals appointed by the mayor and city council to all City commissions, committees, boards, task forces, or other City bodies unless specifically exempted from this chapter by the city council."

For this reason, §2-7-63(a) appears to apply to Lopez-Aguilar.

Substantial Interest in an Entity

According to Lopez-Aguilar, she has worked with LHCF as a full time employee since January 2015. We received payroll and tax information from LHCF that indicated that Lopez-Aguilar receives a salary that exceeds \$5,000, the minimum income required by City Code to establish a substantial interest in an entity, during the 12 months prior to the vote described in this complaint. Specifically, from August 2015 to July 2016, Lopez-Aguilar appears to have earned \$43,145 from LHCF. **[Exhibit E]**

Because of this income, Isabel Lopez-Aguilar appears to have a substantial interest in LHCF, as defined in City Code §2-7-2 (11):

"...or funds received by the person from the other person or entity either during the previous 12 months or the previous calendar year equaled or exceeded \$5,000 in salary, bonuses, commissions or professional fees..."

Exhibit A

Vote or Decision

On July 27, 2016, HLQLRAC discussed and voted on budget recommendations for the City's Fiscal Year 2017 budget. According to the Chair of the commission and confirmed in a recording from that meeting, a commissioner proposed funding a healthcare outreach program that the City funded the previous year and using the same contractors as before, one of which was LHCF. **(Meeting recording 160727_00 at 2:27:30)** Specifically, the program's scope was Affordable Care Act (ACA) outreach, education, and enrollment. **(Recording 160727_00 at 2:30:00)**. On item 4b (iii) of that meeting's minutes, it was proposed that \$300,000 should be allocated to both LHCF and another nonprofit for "outreach, education, and enrollment services for the increased enrollment of the City's uninsured population." The motion was proposed by two other Commissioners. **[Exhibit F & G]** The chair, who also worked for LHCF, abstained from the vote because of a potential conflict of interest. **[Exhibit H]**

We found evidence that Isabel Lopez-Aguilar was present at the July 27, 2016 meeting where item 4b was discussed and voted on. **[Exhibit H]** We also found evidence that Lopez-Aguilar did not abstain from the vote on item 4b(iii). **[Exhibit F & G]**

This vote resulted in a formal commission recommendation from the Commission to Council. **[Exhibit F]** The funding recommendation of \$300,000 for LHCF and another nonprofit was included in HLQLRAC's budget proposal dated August 10, 2016, **[Exhibit I]** and subsequently in the City's FY17 Budget Concept Menu dated September 7, 2016. **[Exhibit J]** The City's budget approved by Council on September 14, 2016 included \$300,000 recommended in the commission's budget proposal for outreach, education, and enrollment services for "uninsured communities". **[Exhibit K, L, & M]** According to the LHCF's contract with the City of Austin and other City documents, more than half of this money (\$200,000) appears to have gone to LHCF. **[Exhibit N]**

Failure to Disclose and Recuse

City Code §2-7-64(a): Disclosure of Conflict of Interest states:

"A city official shall disclose the existence of any substantial interest he may have in a natural person, entity, or property which would be affected by a vote or decision of the body of which the City official is a member..."

We found evidence that Isabel Lopez-Aguilar did not disclose her interest or connection with Latino HealthCare Forum, as required by Code. **[Exhibit G & H]** Additionally, City Code §2-7-64(b) requires:

"[an] unsalaried City Official, prior to the vote or decision, either shall file an affidavit as required by Chapter 171 (Regulation of Conflicts of Interest of Officers of Municipalities, Counties, and Certain Other Local Governments) of the Local Government Code or, if not so required, shall publicly disclose in the official records of the body the nature and extent of such interest."

We reviewed the attendance sign-in sheet for July 27, 2016, and found evidence that Lopez-Aguilar signed the attendance sheet but did not indicate that she had any conflict of interest. **[Exhibit H]** Additionally, we found evidence that during the discussion of item 4b (iii) and before the vote, Lopez-Aguilar did not recuse herself. **[Exhibit G & H]**

When interviewed, Lopez-Aguilar admitted voting on item 4b (iii) but stated that she did not feel she had a conflict since she believed her salary would not be directly be paid by the recommended funds in item 4b (iii).

These acts appear to constitute violations of the following criteria:

- §2-7-63(a): Prohibition of Conflict of Interest
- §2-7-64(a): Disclosure of Conflict of Interest
- §2-1-24(b): Conflict of Interest and Recusal

Investigation Criteria

Conflict of Interest

City Code §2-7-63 – PROHIBITION OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST

(A) A city official or employee may not participate in a vote or decision on a matter affecting a natural person, entity, or property in which the official or employee has a substantial interest; provided, however, that this provision shall not prohibit any member of the city council from participating in a discussion relating to a petition certified to the city council by the city clerk which petition seeks the recall of said member of the city council.

City Code §2-7-64 – DISCLOSURE OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST

(A) A city official shall disclose the existence of any substantial interest he may have in a natural person, entity, or property which would be affected by a vote or decision of the body of which the City official is a member or that he serves as a corporate officer or member of the board of directors of a nonprofit entity for which a vote or decision regarding funding by or through the City is being considered.

(B) To comply with this section, a councilmember or unsalaried City official, prior to the vote or decision either shall file an affidavit as required by Chapter 171 (Regulation of Conflicts of Interest of Officers of Municipalities, Counties, and Certain Other Local Governments) of the Local Government Code or, if not so required, shall publicly disclose in the official records of the body the nature and extent of such interest.

City Code § 2-1-24 - CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND RECUSAL.

(A) This section is cumulative of Chapter 2-7 (Ethics And Financial Disclosure) and Local Government Code Chapter 171 (Regulation Of Conflicts Of Interest Of Officers Of Municipalities, Counties, And Certain Other Local Governments). Under this section a board member has a conflict of interest if the City Code or another law prohibits the board member from taking action on a vote or decision before the board.

(B) At each meeting, a board member shall sign an attendance sheet and shall indicate:

- (1) that the board member has no conflict of interest related to any item on the agenda; or
- (2) the number of an agenda item for which the board member has a conflict of interest.

City Code §2-7-2 – Definitions

(1) **AFFECTED** means in the case of a[n] entity [...], means reasonably likely to be subject to a direct economic effect or consequence, either positive or negative, as a result of the vote or decision in question. [...] The vote or decision need not be the only producing cause of the economic effect or consequence reasonably likely to result. In determining whether a person, entity or property is or was "affected by" a vote or decision, it shall not be necessary to prove the actual existence or occurrence of an economic effect or consequence if such effect or consequence would be reasonably expected to exist or occur. [...]

(4) **DECISION** [...] A decision of a City employee means any action in which the employee exercises discretionary authority, including but not limited to the issuance of permits, imposition or collection of fines or fees, authorizations for expenditures, and other non-ministerial acts.

(5) **DISCRETIONARY AUTHORITY** means the power to exercise any judgment in a decision or action.

(6) **ENTITY** means a sole proprietorship, partnership, limited partnership, firm, corporation, professional corporation, holding company, joint stock company, receivership, trust or any other entity recognized by law

Investigation Criteria

through which business may be conducted, but does not include a governmental body.

(10) **SUBSTANTIAL INTEREST** means an interest in another person or an entity if: [...] funds received by the person from the [...] entity either during the previous 12 months or the previous calendar year equaled or exceeded \$5,000 in salary [...]

Methodology

To accomplish our objective, we performed the following steps:

- reviewed applicable City Code and policy;
- conducted background research;
- conducted interviews with City of Austin and Latino Healthcare Forum staff;
- conducted forensic analysis of email data;
- obtained contract documents between the City of Austin and Latino Healthcare Forum;
- Obtained meeting minutes and other relevant board and commissions documents related to the allegation;
- Obtained City Council meeting documents related to the agenda item in question;
- obtained documents regarding Lopez-Aguilar's employment with the Latino Healthcare Forum; and
- interviewed Lopez-Aguilar.

Investigative Standards

Investigations by the Office of the City Auditor are considered non-audit projects under the Government Auditing Standards and are conducted in accordance with the ethics and general standards (Chapters 1-3), procedures recommended by the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners (ACFE), and the ACFE Fraud Examiner's Manual. Investigations conducted also adhere to quality standards established by the Council of the Inspectors General on Integrity and Efficiency (CIGIE), Quality Standards for Investigations, and City Code.

The Office of the City Auditor, per City Code, may conduct investigations into fraud, abuse, or illegality that may be occurring. If the City Auditor, through the Integrity Unit, finds that there is sufficient evidence to indicate that a material violation of a matter within the office's jurisdiction may have occurred, the City Auditor will issue an investigative report and provide a copy to the appropriate authority.

This Contract is made by and between the City of Austin ("the City") acting by and through its Health and Human Services Department ("HHSD"), a home-rule municipality incorporated by the State of Texas, and Latino HealthCare Forum ("Contractor"), a Texas non-profit corporation, having offices at 6601 Felix Ave., Austin, TX 78741.

SECTION 1. GRANT OF AUTHORITY, SERVICES AND DUTIES

1.1 **Engagement of the Contractor.** Subject to the general supervision and control of the City and subject to the provisions of the Terms and Conditions contained herein, the Contractor is engaged to provide the services set forth in the attached Contract Exhibits.

1.2 **Responsibilities of the Contractor.** The Contractor shall provide all technical and professional expertise, knowledge, management, and other resources required for accomplishing all aspects of the tasks and associated activities identified in the Contract Exhibits. The Contractor shall assure that all Contract provisions are met by the Subcontractor.

1.3 **Responsibilities of the City.** The City's Contract Manager will be responsible for exercising general oversight of the Contractor's activities in completing the Program Work Statement. Specifically, the Contract Manager will represent the City's interests in resolving day-to-day issues that may arise during the term of this Contract, shall participate regularly in conference calls or meetings for status reporting, shall promptly review any written reports submitted by the Contractor, and shall approve all requests for payment, as appropriate. The City's Contract Manager shall give the Contractor timely feedback on the acceptability of progress and task reports. The Contract Manager's oversight of the Contractor's activities shall be for the City's benefit and shall not imply or create any partnership or joint venture as between the City and the Contractor.

1.4 **Designation of Key Personnel.** The City's Contract Manager for this Contract, to the extent stated in the preceding section 1.3, shall be responsible for oversight and monitoring of Contractor's performance under this Contract as needed to represent the City's interest in the Contractor's performance.

1.4.1 The City's Contract Manager, Michelle Friedman or designee:

- may meet with Contractor to discuss any operational issues or the status of the services or work to be performed; and

-shall promptly review all written reports submitted by Contractor, determine whether the reports comply with the terms of this Contract, and give Contractor timely feedback on the adequacy of progress and task reports or necessary additional information.

1.4.2 Contractor's Contract Manager, Jill Ramirez, Chief Executive Officer, or designee, shall represent the Contractor with regard to performance of this Contract and shall be the designated point of contact for the City's Contract Manager.

1.4.3 If either party replaces its Contract Manager, that party shall promptly send written notice of the change to the other party. The notice shall identify a qualified and competent replacement and provide contact information.

SECTION 2. TERM

2.1 **Term of Contract.** The Contract shall be in effect for a term of twelve (12) months beginning October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016. There are no authorized extension options.

2.1.1 Upon expiration of the initial term or period of extension, the Contractor agrees to hold over under the terms and conditions of this Contract for such a period of time as is reasonably necessary to re-solicit and/or complete the project (not to exceed 120 calendar days unless mutually agreed upon in writing).

SECTION 3. PROGRAM WORK STATEMENT

3.1 **Contractor's Obligations.** The Contractor shall fully and timely provide all services described in the attached Contract Exhibits in strict accordance with the terms, covenants, and conditions of the Contract and all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, rules, and regulations.

SECTION 4. COMPENSATION AND REPORTING

4.1 **Contract Amount.** The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that, notwithstanding any other provision of this Contract, the maximum amount payable by the City under this Contract for the initial twelve (12) month term shall not exceed the amount approved by City Council, which is \$58,000 (*Fifty Eight Thousand dollars*), for a total Contract amount of \$58,000. Continuation of the Contract beyond the initial twelve (12) months is specifically contingent upon the availability and allocation of funding by City Council.

4.1.1 The Contractor shall expend City funds according to the approved budget categories described in Exhibit B.1, Program Budget and Narrative.

4.1.1.1 **Budget Revision:** The Contractor may make transfers between or among budget categories with the City Contract Manager's prior approval, provided that:

- i. The cumulative amount of the transfers between direct budget categories (Personnel, Operating Expenses, Direct Assistance and/or Equipment/Capital Outlay) is not more than 10% of the program period total –or– \$50,000, whichever is less;
- ii. the transfer will not increase or decrease the total monetary obligation of the City under this Contract; and
- iii. the transfers will not change the nature, performance level, or scope of the program funded under this Contract.

4.1.1.2 Transfers between or among budget categories in excess of 10% will require the City Contract Manager's approval, and must meet all of the conditions outlined in Section 4.1.1.1 (ii) and (iii) above.

- i. The CONTRACTOR must submit a Budget Revision Form to the City prior to the submission of the CONTRACTOR'S first monthly billing to the City following the transfer.

4.1.2 Payment to the Contractor shall be made in the following increments:

4.1.2.1 For the Program Period of October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016, the payment from the City to the Contractor shall not exceed \$58,000 (*Fifty Eight Thousand dollars*).

8.28 Non-Suspension or Debarment Certification. The City is prohibited from contracting with or making prime or sub-awards to parties that are suspended or debarred or whose principals are suspended or debarred from Federal, State, or City of Austin Contracts. By accepting a contract with the City, the Contractor certifies that its firm and its principals are not currently suspended or debarred from doing business with the Federal Government, as indicated by the Exclusions records at SAM.gov, the State of Texas, or the City of Austin.

Program Goals And Objectives

Latino HealthCare Forum (LHCF) provides in-person education, enrollment, and Affordable Care Act (ACA) insurance navigation services in the Austin area. The Secure Your Health program educates clients about the ACA; walks consumers through the entire enrollment and plan selection process; and helps the newly insured maintain and use their insurance.

Contract goals include:

- (1) Educate Austin and Travis County individuals about ACA and Marketplace insurance options, and

Program Services And Delivery

The Secure Your Health program will achieve its goals by empowering Outreach and Enrollment Specialists (OES) who reflect the cultural and linguistic diversity of the target population. The OES will be trained to be knowledgeable of both subsidized and non-subsidized health coverage and qualified health plans. Navigators will be equipped with the information and expertise needed to successfully educate and enroll individuals in coverage regardless of the type of program for which they are eligible.

The program will provide a seamless, "no wrong door" consumer experience regardless of residency or other qualifications. It will promote the retention of existing insurance coverage in public programs.

Outreach: The OES will be divided into two types of activities:

- a)The OES group will drive consumers to outreach, education, and enrollment activities; and



This position will support the cross-sector partnership and promote the three program goals: to improve public safety, address social impacts and long term planning and implementation of neighborhood-based revitalization strategies. The coordinator will conduct and coordinate a variety of educational activities regarding public safety, social services, development and engagement. The coordinator will assist with the Rundberg Educational Advancement District (READ), the Council on At-Risk Youth (CARY) and other youth programs in coordination with the project partners to help facilitate community involvement, public dialogues and consent building to identify and resolve community issues. The motion was proposed by Commissioner Lopez Aguilar, seconded by Commissioner Ramirez, and was approved unanimously.
 - v. The Commission recommends to fund the Montopolis and Del Valle Community Health Assessment for \$150,000. The areas of Montopolis and Del Valle are areas marked by a lack of investment for decades, rapid growth, and need. Predominantly Latino and very low-income, these areas are the direction where many of the current city residents who cannot afford to stay in Austin are headed. There is a lack of services in this area and a need to ascertain what health conditions impact these communities. This project will consist of data analysis, stakeholder interviews, and focus groups. The motion was proposed by Commissioner Velasquez, seconded by Commissioner Zamora, and was approved by all (Velasquez Chairing, Ramirez recused).



Program Goals And Objectives

Latino HealthCare Forum (LHCF) provides in-person education, enrollment, and Affordable Care Act (ACA) insurance navigation services in the Austin area. The Secure Your Health program educates clients about the ACA; walks consumers through the entire enrollment and plan selection process; and helps the newly insured maintain and use their insurance.

LHCF will build on its use of Community Health Worker/Promotores and use them as Outreach and Enrollment Specialists (OES) with their cultural and linguistic competency in working with "hard to reach" vulnerable populations. The primary target of LHCF's campaign is the Latino uninsured residents in select zip codes in Austin/Travis County which is upwards of over 100,000. Of these 100,000, at least 30,000 continue to qualify for the insurance marketplace and about 25% require deliberate assistance.

Contract goals include:

- 1) Educate Austin and Travis County individuals about ACA and Marketplace insurance options, and
- 2) Reduce the number of uninsured and underinsured residents by enrolling individuals in Marketplace plans

Program Clients Served

This Agreement is exempt from City of Austin Client Eligibility Requirements found in Exhibit A.3. The program is required to serve all clients who are interested in enrollment support, regardless of residency or income. While services are open to anyone and there are no income or geographic restrictions, LHCF primarily serves vulnerable minority populations, populations with limited English proficiency, and households with incomes at or below 200% FPL who live in Austin/Travis County.

The program targets individuals who are eligible for:

- 1) Any subsidized program (marketplace subsidy, Medicaid, Medicare, etc.) and
- 2) Non-subsidized individual marketplace.

Any and all data collected are in compliance with provisions of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) and state Community Partnership Program Assistor requirements. Underlying compliance requirements are those of HIPAA guidelines in dealing with personal health information provisions.

When City of Austin monitors come on-site to review enrollment client files, LHCF will be able to provide the following information for a subset of clients who reside in Austin/Travis County and who have projected incomes for the following year to be less than 200% FPL in the performance spreadsheet:

Program Services And Delivery

The Secure Your Health program will achieve its goals by employing Outreach and Enrollment Specialists (OES) who reflect the cultural and linguistic diversity of the target population. The OES will be trained to be knowledgeable of both subsidized and non-subsidized health coverage and qualified health plans. Navigators will be equipped with the information and expertise needed to successfully educate and enroll individuals in coverage regardless of the type of program for which they are eligible. OES will adhere to a code of conduct, confidentiality and guideline agreements, and quality assurance standards

ENROLLMENT & NAVIGATION

LHCf enrollment assistance takes many forms at various times in the process of enrollment.

Enrollment in the ACA is possible to be completed using various methods including paper application, on-line electronic application submission and over-the-phone applications. All methods require the submission of specific eligibility documentation at the time of application and/or within a required period of time as specified. No application is considered complete without this required documentation. LHCf provides application assistance in support of any means selected by the client.

LHCf achieves this by:

- Client support via phone
- Client support in person

LHCf provides clients pre-application, application and post ACA application support. This assistance includes assessing health coverage needs for the client and/or family members, discussing options for their coverage and available community providers by plan, getting a health plan member card, explaining the monthly premium statement, reporting of life changes to ACA, adding new family members to the plan and other navigation assistance.

System for Collecting and Reporting Program Data

LHCf will be utilizing the Enroll ATX tool that is customizable and will enable LHCf to gather and report data, as per HIPAA and City of Austin requirements. During a site visit, LHCf will provide a spreadsheet roster of unduplicated client identifiers that are in compliance with HIPAA requirements.

Performance Evaluation

LHCf evaluates performance against established project specific metrics.
